## North Bay Owners Asked to Bend a Little

With only six months remaining on his abbreviated term as President of the Ludlow Maintenance Commission (LMC) Board of Trustees, Michael Walker has a list of eleven things, important to him, which he will work on in the months ahead. Walker was elected in September to replace D. A. Routt who resigned.

Re-emphasizing thoughts expressed in the October *Voice*, Walker said, "I continue to think the need for all of us to bend a little in order to find opportunities for consensus is our most critical challenge." In a letter sent recently to all LMC members, he narrowed down his list and called on them to focus their attention on several objectives.

Walker recently created a Long Range Planning Committee, comprised of a large cross-section of the North Bay community, that is to produce a plan considering the strengths and weaknesses both of the community and the LMC. "...Committee members will have no hidden agendas, will agree to work towards consensus, and ultimately agree with the majority recommendations," said Walker. The plan should also include an assessment of facilities and recreation needs. "The plan must be something LMC members can accept and get behind," Walker added.

All LMC Standing Committees have been asked by Walker to identify CC&Rs that may be confusing, inconsistent, inequitable, or impossible to enforce in their areas of responsibility. The CC&R Committee will then draft necessary modifications, possibly including an enforcement process for those who purposely and/or repeatedly violate CC&Rs.


Perhaps one of the greatest causes of polarization in the LMC is between those living here and non-resident members. Over one-third of the total membership has never built homes on lots they own. In addition, there are many owners holding multiple lots and paying multiple dues without additional benefits. According to Beach Club management, 77 people own 2 lots, 8 own 3 lots, 2 own 4, 1 owns 6, and Port Ludlow Associates owns 7. Considering that LMC annual dues are just under \$400, one owner pays nearly \$2,400 annually and PLA pays close to \$2,800.

In contrast, only a very few privately-held lots exist in the South Bay. Despite a contract between purchasers and Pope Resources that houses had to be built within eighteen months, enforcement action was never taken. The South Bay Community Association (SBCA) does not collect dues payments until a home is built.

Walker feels more equitable treatment of all LMC members is necessary. He points out vastly different needs of (a) non-resident members, (b) residents who frequently use facilities, and (c) residents who never use LMC property. He has asked the Finance Committee to work with other committees and the community at large for recommended alternative approaches to resolve these inequities.

## Memories

Continuing thoughts from Floyd Thoren shared with staff writer Maureen Poole.

As we ride along Oak Bay Road or up the hill on Swansonville Road, we may not give much thought to just how modern these roads are. Prior to 1900 and continuing into the '30s the land in Port Ludlow and Swansonville was being developed into farms and wood lots by early pioneers—some of whose names were Bill and George Bates, Severin Johnson, Isack Klockers, Hans Swanson, Ole Vogt and Fred Warner.

Lumber was the major business. By 1905 all of Swansonville and the surrounding areas were logged off. From the Thoren farm, Mount Rainier was visible. Most of the trees we see today are second growth. Back then Swansonville was known as Forest Hill. Bill Bates donated five acres of land for the Forest Hill cemetery. Clearing fields for farming by using dynamite was an accepted practice, and youngsters (like Floyd) were fascinated to watch huge stumps fly 50 feet into the air when a field was being cleared. Few of these early farms remain today, but a walk through the cemetery will show the markers and resting places of these early settlers.

In 1927, narrow dirt roads provided the connection for farmers, loggers and mill workers. Travel from the farm in Swansonville to visit "Grandpa" was an exciting event in the life of four-year-old Floyd, even though it was made on foot. Then about a forty-five minute walk, the time was shortened a few years later when Uncle Dave bought an Oldsmobile Reo. Along with visiting relatives, shopping in Port Townsend became much easier.

As Millie and son Floyd trudged to Grandpa's house at the head of the Bay, they needed to cross a lot owned by the Warners. Both Fred and his wife were busy about the farm, and neither minded a neighbor crossing. On a particularly wonderful day, as Millie opened the gate near the barn, a voice called out "come have a cookie." Fred was sitting near the woodpile, taking a rest from chopping, and Mrs. Warner had just baked a batch of the best-tasting cookies a four-year-old could imagine. This treat was to be repeated many more times as Floyd and Millie visited her father.

Where to get a cup of coffee? Floyd will tell us next time.


## Local Residents Share Adventure in Bali

Port Ludlow Fire and Rescue District completed the final stage of its commitment to the residents of the District this past month when two new fire engines and an aid car (ambulance) were placed in service.

At the time of the levy election in 1995, the promise was to add personnel, build a new station and acquire new equipment. Firefighters and paramedics have welcomed the vehicles with wide smiles.

A large red mobile “Fire Blast” unit may have been seen at the station in September. The training facility was borrowed from Clark County and allowed firefighters two days of real life experience using breathing apparatus amidst smoke and heat. Chief Wayne Kier said, “This type of training is required by the State. Having the unit on site allowed personnel to train locally, thus saving money, and kept them available for local emergencies.”

In the November General Election we will vote for Fire Commissioner, District 3, Position 3. Although Howard Morse's name will be listed, he has moved and withdrawn. Another Port Ludlow resident, Mike Porter, has stepped up and officially registered to run as a "write-in."

To write in a name requires two steps: First write in the name on the line labeled "write-in," being sure to close the arrow to the right of the name. This alerts the reading machine of a write-in so it can be counted. Otherwise no one will see the name, and your efforts will be wasted.

Who is Mike Porter and why should we write in his name? He grew up in Spokane, worked on his uncle's wheat ranch, went on to college, and met his wife, Carole, who he says still keeps him focused and on course. They raised a family while he spent 20 years in the US Air Force flying jets, then another 17 years with Alaska Airlines, also flying jets. He retired two years ago, but is not yet tired. After skiing, hiking, mountain climbing, kayaking, biking (cross-country trip last year), rollerblading, and ballroom dancing, he has energy left over, so decided to pursue a long-time appreciation of firefighters and what they do. In the past he helped set up a Fire District at Schweitzer Mountain Resort in Idaho and was one of the first Commissioners.

Mike takes managing the budget very seriously. He feels that, by projecting and planning for future needs, the budget will not be stressed by emergency expenditures. He wants to maintain the quality of service in Port Ludlow where 80 percent of the responses are for Emergency Medical Services. In this area, we enjoy one of the lowest ratings used by insurance companies to determine the cost of fire insurance. The lower the number, the lower the cost of insurance. Finally, Mike would like to create volunteer opportunities for some of the older, less fit residents of Port Ludlow.

Port Ludlow lost a hard-working member of the community when Howard Morse and his wife, Bobbi, left for a new home in Florida. Several years ago, Howard, a retired physician, took on the task of organizing Disaster Services for Port Ludlow. He and Bobbi recruited and compiled a roster of volunteers in the community, brought together Red Cross and other emergency and service groups, and formed a triage. They encouraged those of us who volunteered to take as many classes as we could, with both of them by our sides.

Howard was instrumental in getting the community involved in CERT (Community Emergency Response Team), in which many of us participated, and also took the Red Cross Training Classes with us, taught CPR and First Aid classes, took radio communications courses, educated the volunteers, and set up quarterly radio drills. He worked tirelessly in his efforts for Disaster Services, and was a great communicator and recruiter.

Howard also served as a Trustee and Officer of the Ludlow Maintenance Commission (LMC), volunteering his time on the Operations, Finance and Greenbelt Committees during his three-year tenure.

Governor Gary Locke appointed Howard to serve on an advisory committee for the State of Washington, and he was completing his third year as a Fire Commissioner for Port Ludlow Fire and Rescue. Fire Commissioner Gene Carmody noted that Morse had made a sizable contribution to District #3, and that he was serving as the current Chairman of the Board at the time of their move to Florida. Carmody added, "His leadership will be missed."

## Impact of Pit-to-Pier Project Discussed

The Hood Canal Coalition, led by John Fabian, presented an overview of Fred Hill's proposed expansion of gravel mining in the Thorndyke area, the Pit-to-Pier Project, to a Bay Club audience on October 8. The Coalition consists of over 2,000 citizens and 40 organizations that oppose the plan. County Commissioners Dan Titterness and Glen Huntingford were present.

Larry Mays described the project and listed objections. Fred Hill Materials (FHM) proposes transporting 7–10 million tons of sand and gravel a year (15 times current production) to ships and barges in Hood Canal via a massive conveyor belt. Vessels would pass through the Hood Canal Bridge to distant markets, e.g., Singapore. The attendant loading pier would extend 1,100 feet into Hood Canal to accommodate ocean-going ships 740 feet in length and weighing up to 60,000 tons.

Objections to the project involve size (up to 21,000 acres) and inconsistency with current zoning. Additionally, barging involves more openings of the Hood Canal Bridge and the possibility of collision, with disastrous effects on Peninsula residents. The 1,322 bridge/ship collisions between 1992 and 2001 in the US suggest a real threat. Negative impacts on wildlife from conveyor and pier construction, the operation of the mine, and introduction of non-native species into the Canal can be expected. Other objections include noise, visual degradation, disruption of aquifer, and setting precedent for further industrialization of the Olympic Peninsula.

On December 9, 2002, Jefferson County Commissioners approved a 690-acre Mineral Resource Land (MRL) Overlay, a first step to extended mining. To date, no permits have been issued and no environmental impact statements have been completed.

Titterness defended MRL approval on the basis that full disclosure is beneficial. Fifteen conditions must be met before the project can go forward, including complete analysis of environmental and transportation issues.

Benefits to Jefferson County appear sparse. Attendees were told regulations prevent Jefferson County from receiving sales taxes, and little new employment would be created. Barging wouldn't decrease truck traffic. The Coalition maintains the County can stop the project. For information, see [www.hoodcanalcoalition.org](http://www.hoodcanalcoalition.org).

## Hikers Lost Weight on Alaska Cruise

How many of us have lost weight on a cruise? Not many, but it can be done. Working out or fast-walking the promenade deck can do it. But a more pleasant way is to hike at your cruise ship stops. Recently the Port Ludlow Hiking Club did just that.

At our first stop, Juneau, 16 hikers headed for the Mendenhall Glacier and did the East Glacier Loop Trail, about four miles. Despite the rain, we had a scenic overlook of the Glacier with an elevation gain of only 400 feet.

Next came Sitka and we did seven miles. Outstanding was the Indian River and seeing thousands of humpy salmon on their upriver trek to spawn. To satisfy the stronger hikers we divided into two groups, with the macho group going further up the valley. Unusual for Southeast Alaska in September, we had beautiful weather, even sunshine. This trek took us through Totem Park to admire the beautifully carved totem poles. It was unanimous that the Sitka hike was the highlight of the entire Alaska cruise.

When in Ketchikan we hiked Deer Mountain, which rises out of the city. Time did not permit summiting the 3,000-foot peak so we went half way. The trail was rough, caused by the spring snow runoff making the hike more strenuous, but the more hardy welcomed the challenge.

These hikes are in the Tongas National Forest and trail information can readily be obtained from the Forest Service in the three cities. While we did not stop at Skagway, there are also excellent trails in this area, one accessible from the cruise ship pier rising to several alpine lakes.

Probably the biggest challenge is the weather. Southeast Alaska is known for its rain. Ketchikan has an average of 150 inches. Gortex type jackets or ponchos are strongly recommended, even an umbrella helps. Good durable hiking boots are a must. Several of our party had tennis shoes and they can tell you how inadequate they were.

## OWSI Explains Late Payment Policy

Larry Smith, President of Olympic Water and Sewer Inc. (OWSI), advises that OWSI has a strict payment policy. The Washington State Code (WAC480-110-355) states that a water bill can be due a minimum of 15 days after it is mailed and, according to Smith, this is the standard applied by our water provider.

If a bill is not paid by the due date, it is considered delinquent. Approximately seven days after the bill is delinquent, a reminder letter is sent. If a response is not received, a disconnect notice is then sent giving a minimum of eight days for payment to be made. If the bill is not paid by the eighth day, a 24-hour notice of disconnect is delivered to the residence in question and the water disconnected on the day and time specified. There is a \$50 reconnect charge for both the water and sewer, for a total of \$100. Since a sewer can't be disconnected, a lien may be placed on the property.

After discussing the public's general unawareness of the policy and the consequences for late or no payment, Smith agreed to periodically include a reminder of this policy along with their other mailings. This should help keep us all on the straight and narrow as well as wet.

## Meeting Highlights

At the September 18 Port Ludlow Village Council (PLVC) Workshop, the Trails Committee displayed the interpretive signs for the David Cunningham Memorial Trail. Grant and Nonie Sharpe did research, while Phyllis Hansen did the artwork for the signs that will soon be installed. The North Bay Greenbelt Trail between Swansonville and Walker, commencing at Rainier Lane, is finished. Thanks were given to Olly Gardner for his hard work.

Dwayne Wilcox proposed that Port Ludlow Associates (PLA) donate 8–10 acres of land to create a memorial park for loved ones. Greg McCarry said PLA has a problem with other entities also wanting land (specifically, the tennis group). He explained that there is a lot of land, but not much access to it. He wants a specific request before he can respond. McCarry said PLVC's ability to receive property and maintain it must be resolved first. He would like to see a strategic plan and indicated we need to define PLVC's long-term mission.

The areas PLA would wish to have PLVC assume ownership of are the Twin Islands, the Riparian Zone (approximately 200 feet on each side of Ludlow Creek from Paradise Bay Road back to Oak Bay Road) and the utility company. Dwayne Wilcox reminded the Council that the County Planning Commission still needs a Port Ludlow resident to replace Pat Rodgers.

## Do you know *Aplodontia rufa*?

This small mammal is a fellow resident of Port Ludlow. Commonly called “mountain beavers” or “boomers,” they live in many parts of our community, mostly in woods with uncompacted soils. You may have seen the entrances to their burrows, about the size of rabbit holes, but the animals are shy and seldom seen. We have had four sightings on our property in seven years. Brown and about the size of a small muskrat or a small loaf of brown bread, with short furry tails and visible ears, they rarely exceed four pounds in weight. Although so small, they are the only known host to the world’s largest flea (*Hystricopsylla schefferi*, about one-third of an inch long). Like other rodents, they have ever-growing chisel-like incisors to cut down plants for food, and molars to grind it.

Thought to go back as much as 60 million years, Aplodontia are considered most primitive of the rodents because they cannot concentrate impurities in their urine and they cannot sweat or pant to regulate their body temperatures. They require a lot of water for their size, either from drinking or from eating large amounts of succulent plants. Temperature is controlled by a system of cool, humid burrows without which the animal cannot survive. Primarily nocturnal, they do not hibernate in the winter.

Burrows are organized on a system similar to the modern apartment building with common runways and entrances, but with individual, fiercely defended chambers for nesting and food storage. Other chambers are kept for waste products and for balls of soil and rocks to plug the burrows in defense. Litters of from two to four young occur in the spring, and young are weaned at about eight weeks. Full size and maturity are reached in the second year, and life expectancy is about five or six years.

They eat almost any plant and we watched one individual select rhododendron leaves, wild flowers, Shasta daisies and hostas in one fifteen-minute frantic gathering foray. Still, being reclusive, they seldom live close enough to our cultivated plants to cause serious damage. If an unwanted burrow should erupt in your garden, you might put some mothballs or crystals in it. This will not harm the animal but will likely encourage it to plug that entrance and strike out in another direction.

Aplodontia are restricted to the West Coast with seven subspecies ranging from British Columbia to northern California, and spread east to the Cascades and Sierra

Nevada. Mostly they live at lower elevations so both “mountain” and “beaver” are misnomers. It is interesting to know that, within our community, we live our parallel lives, so near, but largely unaware of each other. Be watchful, especially in early morning and near dusk and perhaps you will be one of those fortunate few to have seen the elusive “mountain beaver.”

## News from the Recycling Area

Before you read this, the County Board of Commissioners will possibly have approved the draft contract between the County and Skookum Recycling. This contract will provide for recycling green glass (typically wine bottles) and recycling solid colored plastic (typically juice, detergent and bleach containers). These additional recyclables should be on-line by January 2004. Do not bring them to the recycling area prior to then.

An observer was unobtrusively located inside various bottle and can bins. Here's what we learned: Most of us put only recyclable materials into the bins. However, very few flatten our plastic beverage containers. Here is an area where many of us can improve. Un-flattened containers take up much space, and their bins are often the quickest to overflow. Have you wondered why some dumpsters combine both clear and brown glass into one bin? Sorting clear and brown glass creates much additional sorting work for Skookum, but they do it to provide a third bin for plastics and cans. If we would simply flatten our beverage containers, this capacity problem would be minimized.

There are others who put some of their recyclable bottles and cans into the wrong bins. It apparently results either from carelessness or haste. Some do not rinse their containers, creating very unpleasant conditions for the Skookum employees.

## Brighten the House with Amaryllis

*Hippeastrum* are popular winter gifts because they bloom in December and January. *Hippeastrum* belong to the *Amaryllidaceae* family, and are mistakenly call Amaryllis. The family of *Amaryllidaceae* has narrow flat leaves with large trumpet-like flowers. The flowers usually appear before the leaves; this phenomenon is

known as hysteranthy. There can be as many as eight 12-inch flowers on a single stalk.

Amaryllis originated in the Andes Mountains of South America, so none of the 1,300 species will tolerate Port Ludlow winters out of doors but are easy to grow indoors. Now is a good time to purchase bulbs, which should exceed 2 inches in diameter: anything smaller may not bloom.

Place the *Amaryllis hippeastrum* in a pot about one to two inches wider than the largest part of the bulb, with one-third to one-half of the bulb above the soil. This keeps the bulb's "nose" dry and reduces the chance of a fungal disease. For the same reason do not water directly over the "nose" of the bulb. The potting medium should be well drained; equal parts of peat and perlite make an excellent potting medium. Place in bright light and water when the soil surface feels dry to the touch. Once a week is usually adequate. The plant prefers temperatures between 70 and 75 degrees F, but once flowers appear temperatures around 65 degrees F will prolong the life of the flowers. It is also a good idea to remove each blossom as it wilts.

When flowering is finished, remove the stalk and start feeding the plant generously with a broad-spectrum liquid fertilizer that contains nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium. At this time you want to promote leaf and bulb growth: the bigger the bulb the bigger the blooms. The bulb can be repotted any time after it is finished blooming. In September, place the plant in a cool dark place, quit watering and fertilizing for two months, and remove any dry foliage.

Eight weeks later or by the first of November you should see the flower bud emerge. Move the plant into a sunny location and start watering again. At this time a bloom booster fertilizer can be used one time only. If ten weeks have passed and there is still no sign of a flower bud, go ahead and move the bulb into a sunny location and start watering.

For variety you may want to consider *Amaryllis Papillo Butterfly*, which looks more like an orchid. Also, *Amaryllis belladonna lilies* are nice because they bloom a little later, and are perfect for Valentine gifts. However, there is not the color variety in the belladonna that exists in the *Amaryllis hippeastrum*. Most *belladonna lilies* are pink or white.

Like the Amaryllis, gardening in Port Ludlow is going dormant, but will emerge this spring with new ideas and plants. Bloom and Grow.

## Tangoheart Features Dancers from Buenos Aires

Who can forget Al Pacino tango dancing in *Scent of a Woman*? That scene fueled many a fantasy for both men and women drawn to Argentina's sensual dance. On **Saturday, November 8**, 8:00 p.m., at the Bay Club, The Seattle City Sextet will perform *Tangoheart*—an evening of passionate music and beautiful dancing highlighted by professional tango dancers, Eva Lucero and Patricio Touceda. With their dramatic and romantic movement, they exemplify the art of the tango.

Both highly regarded in Buenos Aires, Lucero and Touceda have been dancing together for three years. Since coming to the US in 2002, they've performed Off-Broadway at the Helen Hayes Theatre in New York, in Michelle Badion's *Tango Cabaret* in Seattle, and in *Tangos ... for la Milonga* at Seattle's Meany Hall and Orange County Performing Arts Center in Costa Mesa, California.

*goheart* goes beyond entertainment—it's a sensual life experience not to be missed—a musical and dance retrospective of the greatest twentieth century tango figure, Astor Piazzolla. Ostracized from Buenos Aires society for a quarter of a century because he tampered with the traditional tango, Piazzolla created the nuevo tango, a modern form written for listening rather than dancing.

Though characterized by passionate melodies interwoven with driving rhythms—heavily influenced by jazz, Bach, and Stravinsky—tango remains at the heart of Piazzolla's music.

Tickets are \$15 and are available at the Bay Club. Flex Passes are \$81 for six concerts and can be used for one or more people, for one or more concerts. Flex Passes should be exchanged in advance for performance tickets at the Bay Club to be assured of a seat. All seating is festival style for all but season ticket holders who enjoy reserved seating. ## Wall-Mounted Tableaux

The Northwind Arts Center in Port Townsend presents *Dodging the Light*, a show of new work by mixed media sculptor Susan Langlois, throughout the month of November. Displayed in a darkened gallery space, Langlois uses shadows as both structure and metaphor for a series of relief sculptures capturing the remnants of childhood. Her wall-mounted tableaux allow the viewer a glance into the private, ritual theaters of children's play. The artist gives her work two separate viewing dimensions by mounting fluorescent lights behind screens of prepared fabrics stretched behind Plexiglas. The fabric layers carry one set of imagery, while turning the light on reveals a second.

## Rules of Golf

One of the fundamental keys in any rules situation is the location of the ball. The specific location a ball is in will have a tremendous influence on which rules apply and how they are implemented. Understanding the following will affect how you may proceed in every day play.

A ball is "on the green" when any part of it touches the surface of the green. It is not "on the green" if it rests on the edge of the fringe overhanging the green.

A ball lies "through the green" when it is on any part of the course except when it is in any course hazard, or on the teeing ground or green of the hole being played.

A ball is in a "water hazard" when any part of it touches the line or stakes marking the hazard.

A ball is "out of bounds" when all of it lies out of bounds. Out of bounds is delineated by a line between the nearest inside points (fairway side) at ground level of two OB stakes.






