

Display and Respect for the Flag of the United States of America

Many Americans proudly choose to display the U.S. flag, often during National Flag Week leading up to Flag Day on June 14 and around Independence Day on July 4. Whether you always fly the colors or merely during special occasions, it's important to ensure that the flag is displayed with the dignity and respect it deserves.

Keep the flag visible. If you're not flying the flag on a traditional flagpole, your precise concerns may vary and when in doubt, simply ensure that the entire flag is visible and that it is free to billow without obstruction. The flag should not fly during inclement weather unless it is an all-weather flag.

Traditionally, the flag was displayed in public only from sunrise to sunset. However, the flag may be displayed at all times if it's illuminated during darkness. The flag should be raised briskly and lowered ceremoniously. The flag should never be allowed to touch ground.

The flag should be displayed from a staff projecting from buildings of public institutions (e.g., post offices, schools, courthouses, etc.); the union (the starred blue canton) should be placed at the peak of the staff unless the flag is at half-staff. If a patch is sewn on the shoulder of a uniform or jacket of any type, the union must be oriented toward your heart.

The flag should especially be displayed at full staff on the following days (federal holidays are bolded): **New Year's Day, Martin Luther King, Jr. Day**, Inauguration Day, Lincoln's Birthday, **Washington's Birthday, Presidents' Day**, Easter Sunday, Mothers Day, Armed Forces Day, **Memorial Day**, Flag Day, Fathers Day, **Independence Day, Labor Day**, Constitution Day, **Columbus Day, Veterans Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day**, and other days as may be proclaimed by the president of the United States.

When the flag is in such condition that it is no longer a fitting emblem for display, it should be destroyed in a dignified way, preferably by burning.

Retirement Living Options

Overwhelming is an understatement when it comes to choosing from the myriad of options for retirement living. If you are considering moving to some type of retirement facility, there are many personal aspects to consider. What can you afford? What level of independence do you prefer? What level of health care, if any, do you or your spouse need? What geographical area do you prefer? Do you want to be near your children and grandchildren? What services, amenities, and activities do you want available such as golf, tennis, fitness club, library, beauty salon, your own kitchen or a public dining room, outdoor spaces and walking trails?

There are some retirement homes that offer both independent and assisted living services. Others provide Alzheimer's care, others Memory Care, and some very large retirement facilities have all of these services within the same campus. Many offer the choice of prepared meals in a clubhouse, delivered meals to your unit, or you can prepare food in your own kitchen.

Another alternative to retirement homes is to remain in your own home. AARP research found that nearly 90 percent of Americans hope to remain in their own home as they age. If this is true for you, you might also consider simply downsizing. If you find that your health is becoming an increasingly important factor in deciding your living arrangement, and you're discovering that your home might be unsafe for your specific health issues, then you could consider installing safety features such as hand rails, stair lifts or ramps. Another option in this case is to hire an in-home professional caregiver. This would generally be less expensive than moving to a retirement home.

Home healthcare providers include services such as meal preparation, dressing, bathing and grooming, medication reminders, light housekeeping, shopping and errands, transportation to medical appointments, plus friendly companionship. When seeking this type of provider, it is important to make sure that the caregiver is licensed, insured, and bonded. Additionally, it is a good idea for you and your loved one to meet with and interview the prospective caregiver to see if they are a good match, meaning if their personalities mesh.

There are many retirement facilities to choose from, both on the Olympic Peninsula and within the greater Seattle area. Most that are called assisted living centers often offer both short-stay options and permanent residences, and they serve meals in communal dining rooms. Also available is on-site skilled nursing service twenty-four hours a day, as well as rehabilitation and physical therapy services.

Additionally, recreational and social activities, house-keeping, and scheduled transportation may be included.

Facilities that offer Alzheimer's and Memory Care are usually combined into one care center. And in addition to the above services, they also focus on activities that encourage socialization. These special care communities require a specific skill set from their personnel and on-site medical staff. Accommodations can be shared or private.

Many people resist the idea of moving into any community specifically for seniors when it becomes apparent that living on their own is no longer safe or healthy. Yet the benefit to such a move is that those kinds of communities offer a wide range of social activities while providing largely unobtrusive health monitoring and medication management.

To determine if you or your loved one might qualify for some type of long-term care, you may choose to have a non-emergency geriatric assessment. Having this done when the situation does not urgently demand it will provide everyone with a clearer understanding of your needs and a foundation for appropriate future care.

No matter what your current status is, it may be time to look into the many options now rather than have to make difficult decisions after your health has degraded, at which time moving anywhere may be too little, too late. You want to have the time when you are still healthy to become familiar with the various neighborhoods and facilities and to feel more secure in your future,

Eating Around

There is a new Asian restaurant in Poulsbo. (Well, maybe it's not so new by now. It all depends on your time frame.) It is called Taste Wei, and it is located near Walmart.

My spouse and I had lunch there a month ago; it was a very good experience. The restaurant is tastefully appointed. It has something of a view if you overlook the roadway below, which is easy to do because most of it is blocked by trees. There are large rooms that can be booked for groups. The staff was pleasant and efficient.

The vegetable tempura was particularly good. The batter was light and crisp and the vegetables, a mixture of beans, zucchini, and sweet potato, retained their character and flavor. We also shared beef with broccoli and a dish called vegetable garden. In line with the name of the restaurant, both were tasty indeed. Platters are large, so, if you are sharing the dishes, three is a lot, and the meal comes with rice. You may be satisfied with two unless

you are particularly hungry. We had enough to take home for another meal.

The menu is large with standard Asian dishes and some more exotic ones such as Dungeness crab with ginger and scallions, and lobster prepared various ways. Soup sufficient for two to five people (\$12.95) or two to three people (\$9.95) can be ordered. The house special is Fish Maw Soup. There is a sushi bar with entrees, special rolls, and a la carte offerings, which include sashimi. Some of the names are interesting (e.g., Lady in Red, Dynamite, Kaki Maki) but we didn't try them so, if you are a sushi fan, you will need to discover what they are on your own.

Taste Wei has a daily happy hour (3:00 to 6:00 p.m.) which offers specials on selected platters and beverages. It has also been offering coupons through the mail. They are accepted in combination with happy hour prices and at other times.

About the Port Ludlow Voice

The *Port Ludlow Voice* was founded in 1998 by Ralph Thomas, a relative newcomer who noted that communication was poor, and with little or no cross-communication between the North Bay and South Bay members. Organizers of community-wide activities did not have a way to reach all residents.

When Olympic Property Group conducted a forum to gather input from the community, lack of communication was high on the list. Thomas recognized the need and single-handedly founded the publication, funding it out of his own pocket.

The *Voice* was founded with the mission to inform its readers of events and activities in the village, and within close proximity. The idea was that the publication would bring the community together, inform residents of events and actions in the community that could affect them and present news from the homeowner associations and the developer. It contained articles, news items, and calendar listings of specific interest to Port Ludlow residents and absentee owners. It was distributed free of charge via postal carrier routes.

Early issues of the *Voice* were written and produced by the founder and publisher with early issues containing about

16 pages. These issues contained articles reflecting the publisher's views and meeting announcements submitted by various community organizations. A minimal staff of three and upwards to six people handled production.

When Thomas moved away, it was clear that a team of people was needed to cover all the various tasks he had handled. With the managing editor, a staff of at least twenty volunteers assumed responsibility for the *Port Ludlow Voice*. Individual editors took responsibility for specific sections of the publication. A business staff was formed with Sally Grything as finance manager, and others stepped up as classified advertising, display advertising, distribution and production managers. To this day, all staff members are volunteers; no one receives a fee of any kind.

When the *Voice* applied for nonprofit status with the Internal Revenue Service, it was as a 501(c)(4) organization, eliminating the claim of donations as a charitable deduction. It operates as a nonprofit with monthly support from the two clubs, the Port Ludlow Village Council, and the developer. Advertising, both retail and classified, is also solicited. Financial statements indicate the *Voice* operates close to breakeven with printing and postage the major expenses. A nonprofit postal permit was obtained that reduced postage costs significantly.

The *Voice* currently has an average 52-page count, quarterly inserts of regularly scheduled activities, approximately 50 display advertisements, and about three pages of classifieds. The all-volunteer staff numbers approximately 20-25, with an unpaid managing editor. All volunteers produce copy on their personal computers and send it to the various editors via email, which is then sent to the copy editor. Proofing is done online. Proofed articles are emailed to the production manager, who creates a dummy which is sent to a printer. The final version is eventually delivered to postal boxes in the community and to subscribers.

Timber Harvesting Committee Petitions County

The following article was submitted as a press release by the ad hoc Timber Committee. It describes a petition delivered to the County Commissioners and County Administrator Philip Morley at their meeting on Monday, April 25. It is reprinted in its entirety. Additional comments follow the reprint.

A “Stop the Logging” petition signed by more than eight hundred of Port Ludlow residents was submitted today to the Jefferson County Board of County Commissioners in Port Townsend, Washington. The petition states: “*The visual blight resulting from clear cut logging has no place within our Master Planned Resort. As a resident of Port Ludlow, I oppose (1) any commercial timber harvesting of our forested Open Space Reserves and (2) any logging of other forested areas within the MPR that is not directly associated with the active conversion of a parcel to residential or other allowable use in accordance with the MPR Development Agreement.*”

The petition is the latest development in a dispute that began one year ago when the county stopped Port Ludlow Associates LLC (PLA) from clear-cutting a large forested area zoned as “Open Space Reserve.” Under the county’s zoning code and according to a Development Agreement signed in 2000 between the county and the original resort developer, an “Open Space Reserve” is to be preserved in perpetuity “to promote or enhance the aesthetic qualities” of the resort. In 2001, the original developer sold its interest in the resort to PLA, a subsidiary of a real estate investment and development firm based in Hong Kong and San Francisco.

Last May PLA responded to the county’s stop-work order by invoking a dispute resolution process under the Development Agreement, which calls for expedited mediation of any dispute before taking the matter to court. Under the agreement, the mediation is to be completed in 60 days. Although PLA’s letter invoking the dispute resolution process was dated May 19, 2015, since that date there has been only one mediation session between the county and PLA, occurring on January 27, 2016. The parties agreed to meet again to try to resolve the dispute, but no firm date has been set for a second try at mediation.

Meanwhile, the hundreds of Port Ludlow residents who signed the “Stop the Logging” petition are growing impatient with the lack of progress in settling the dispute. There are over 600 acres of “Open Space Reserve” and other forested areas within the resort, and residents fear that further logging by PLA will destroy the natural beauty of their “Village in the Woods by the Bay” as Port Ludlow is described on road signs and approaches to the resort community.

In presenting the petition to the county commissioners this morning (sic, April 2, 2016) Dave McDermid said that the petition was “an expression of the community’s “pent up frustration” and demonstrates PLA’s “precarious position” with Port Ludlow residents. Bill Dean, another community representative, traced the history of the development documents, showing that the forested areas within the resort were intended to be preserved as green belts to enhance the natural beauty of the resort area and to provide a buffer against logging on adjacent lands. “Clear cutting is a lot of things, but enhancing aesthetic qualities is not one of them,” said Dean. A third community representative, Dave Jurca, expressed appreciation for the county’s efforts thus far but urged county commissioners not to be timid in dealing with PLA. “The residents of Port Ludlow are depending on you to do your job and enforce the law,” he added.

PLA has agreed to suspend further logging operations within the resort until the mediation process has been concluded. If mediation does not lead to a voluntary settlement with the county, either party may take the dispute to court for a final resolution. Other Comments: In addition to presentations by the ad hoc committee members, summarized above, other residents addressed the commissioners. They expressed a desire to keep the wooded areas in their natural state and

encouraged the commissioners to follow the law and speed up the mediation process. At least one speaker accused the corporation of engaging in “bait and switch” tactics.

On their part the commissioners thanked the attendees for their concern. Phil Johnson commented that “what’s done is done. It’s not an easy fix.” Dave Sullivan said he “appreciated help from the community” and that it would “assist us going forward.” Kathleen Kler said that the logging was announced in advance but that the community may not have understood the impact. She said the county was “using caution for the sake of the residents” who are paying for the process. She also added that trust has been broken between the community, the county, and PLA. Philip Morley announced that an additional mediation session has been scheduled to take place in mid-May.

Simply follow the instructions, placing your raffle ticket in the box and retaining the stub. The winning numbers will be selected at the event. You do not have to be present to win.

The market management would also like to announce plans for adding new products to their merchandise. These will include more fresh produce and fresh donuts, baked daily. For the summer season, they will also have self-serve milk shakes available. The market has obtained a new supplier which will make greater selections of products available for customers.

Old Alcohol Plant Opens as Nonprofit

The old Alcohol Plant has been granted a new life. The Port Hadlock building produced ethyl alcohol years ago and served as a high-end hotel with an art gallery from 2006 to 2011. Owned by Suki James of Bremerton, it was shuttered by the state due to non-payment of taxes. Its new face is as a ten-room inn and a nonprofit providing a way for homeless and low-income people to work their way back to better lives.

The property was purchased by Inn Properties of Port Townsend for \$852,000 in 2014. The up-market portion of the building complex will open in May and offer rooms for \$90 to \$125 a night. There will also be conference rooms and banquet facilities. The spa and restaurant will be managed by private contractors. Rooms are available through *Airbnb.com*.

Another ten rooms (Bayside housing) will be allotted to needy persons for periods of 28 days at a time. Individuals accepted into the program will be assessed a third of their income. Those trading work for shelter will maintain the facility. Applications have been brisk and outnumber available slots. All residents are screened before being accepted.

PLFR Participates in Disaster Coordination Exercise

Jefferson County Dept. of Emergency Management (DEM) together with other local and state response agencies in Washington, Oregon, Idaho and British Columbia; U.S. Military commands, Washington State Office of Emergency Management and FEMA, will take part in a large-scale exercise to test and improve joint operations between all agencies in the event of a catastrophic disaster. The exercise, which has been a work in progress for the past two years, will take place **June 7-10**.

The exercise—Cascadia Rising—will simulate a 9.0 earthquake, resulting tsunami, and aftershocks on the Cascadia Subduction Zone, which runs along the coast from California to Alaska.

According to information from DEM, the exercise will not involve field operations. This is a tabletop exercise at a command and control level. The public will only see the military vehicles that will travel to the Emergency Operations Center in Port Hadlock to work with local emergency management staff.

“We know there are things we do well when it comes to disaster recovery and we also know we will find areas that need improvement,” said DEM Director Bob Hamlin.

The Safety Trailer will be on site for tours and our firefighters will demonstrate how they extricate people from a wrecked car. Jefferson Healthcare Breaks Ground for New Clinic

On May 11 a groundbreaking ceremony was held to herald the beginning of construction for the new, expanded Jefferson Healthcare Clinic in Port Ludlow. The groundbreaking was preceded by a presentation by CEO Mike Glenn at the Bay Club. Glenn introduced members of his hospital board and staff and gave an update on their operations.

Glenn began his talk by reviewing the progress of Jefferson Healthcare, the hospital and the Port Ludlow clinic in the past 5 years. The hospital itself is undergoing a major expansion to the physical facility and to the staff. The focus of the organization has been on improving patient experience, patient safety, and the financial position of the organization. Among the important goals for Jefferson Healthcare are to stay strong, stay current and independent, and to help the community live well.

He also reviewed the history of medical care in Port Ludlow which was spotty and inconvenient. Resident and PLVC Community Development Chair Larry Nobles had worked to encourage Jefferson Healthcare establish a clinic in the village. When Glenn became CEO the idea took finally took off.

Jefferson Healthcare assumed management of a pre-existing clinic building at Port Ludlow Place five years ago. The community promised to support the clinic and they did. Growth was more than expected, making it obvious that more space would be necessary.

Port Ludlow Associates joined Jefferson Healthcare to partner the construction of a new 3500 square foot building. Dr. Shannon Kirshner and Wes Schott will continue to practice at the clinic. The building will have room for additional specialty providers, enhanced radiology, telemedicine, and community education resources, and provide for convenient laboratory draws. Rice Fergus Miller is responsible for the design. PLA will own the building which Jefferson Healthcare will manage. It is located near the Wellness Center at Breaker Lane and Paradise Bay Road.



Brothers Four Make Their 55th Trip to Japan

As you read this issue of the *Voice*, the Brothers Four will be in the middle of a 16-concert tour in Japan. Their music includes folk songs from America, Ireland, Scotland, Africa, Japan and China—acoustic tunes, old and new. Now celebrating their Golden Anniversary, this group is one of my all-time favorites. You just can't help smiling, tapping your feet, and singing when they are around! And we can see and hear them LIVE on **Saturday, October 1** when they do a concert to benefit Dove House.

The original Brothers Four met at the University of Washington in 1956 where they were members of Phi Gamma Delta fraternity (hence the "Brothers" name). They left in 1959 when they secured a contract with Columbia Records. Today's line-up includes Port Ludlow resident Mark Pearson who is guitarist, banjo player, singer and song writer; Mike McCoy, folk performer and singer/songwriter; founding member Bob Flick, bass player, group leader; and singer/songwriter; and Karl Olsen, folk performer, choral director, writer and arranger.

Pearson helps to provide music for twice yearly Civil Rights Pilgrimages sponsored by the University of Washington (UW). Here's a link to find out more—<http://projectpilgrimage.org>. Involvement with this

project has led Pearson to re-enroll at UW where he will receive his degree in 2018—50 years after he left to pursue his musical career! Amazing!

Artists' League Displays Works of Local Male Artists

“Renown” (ri-noun) is “the quality of being widely honored and acclaimed; celebrity” according to the *American Heritage Dictionary*. The Artists of the Month for June fit that description. The group show in the lobby of Sound Bank focuses on some of the male artists of the Port Ludlow Artists’ League (PLPA) who employ a wide range of mediums and techniques to create their unique visions. They are:

Alan Ahtow, photographer: Ahtow’s photography gives the viewer an appreciation for the natural wonder and aesthetics of our lives with a renewed perspective of the everyday things that surround us. He especially enjoys discovering the vast array of artistic structures in found objects to which nature molds, shapes and finally, reclaims.

Walt Biondi, jeweler, author, painter: Primarily known for his beautiful silver jewelry, Biondi is now adding another dimension to his creative soul—that of author. With two books to his name in just the last couple of years, he returns, in between chapters, to his first love of silver and gems, all of which he mines, cuts, and sets.

Larry Davidson, digital photograph manipulation: The computer screen is Davidson’s canvas, using the mouse as his brush. Each of his works of art requires hours of painstaking attention to detail, some taking 80 hours or more to complete. His subjects are found in nature and he focuses on them in such a way as to make them “fly” out of the frame.

Gary Griswold, painter: Griswold’s recurring themes of seas and forests bring a sense of calm and peace to the viewer, taking us into the natural beauty of our Pacific Northwest. Recently added to his collection are scenes from his travels to Italy—a mini-vacation for the viewer’s delight.

Rick McKenzie, photographer: With a degree in forestry, McKenzie managed commercial landscaping which in turn shaped his view of natural surroundings and led him to photograph nature’s own architecture. His love of the outdoors and photography of landscape, nature, and wildlife has evolved into a passion that he shares with his viewers.

James Murphy, painter: With oils as his medium, Murphy chooses to not rely on literal concepts, but instead paints from the heart using intuition and emotion. His paintings depict scenes that exist nowhere on earth, yet seem familiar enough to people that they feel as though they have been to that very spot.

Randy Radock, block printer, painter: Radock is known for his nature-inspired block prints and use of Native American art forms. Each of his pieces is unique, individually hand-inked with each print signed and numbered, part of a limited edition, never reproduced or computer-generated. He prints on various materials, including tapa cloth, slate, papyrus, and handmade papers.

Gary Settle, photographer, painter: A 45-year career in photojournalism has given Settle a keen eye as to focus, timing, and expression. A host of celebrities formed many of his earlier photographs, but now his scenes of life in the Northwest as well as his recent travels, dominate his viewfinder, much to our delight.

Ken Thomas, fused glass, sculptor: A devotee of modern art, Thomas’s fused glass masks, fish, and “ladder” people are both whimsical and colorful, giving a vibrancy and joy to each piece. Metal sculptures are a new focus for him and his “yard art” turns gardens into bright spots of color even on the gray days of the Pacific Northwest.

Jim Watson-Gove, painter: Strong colors are in Gove’s paintbrush making his art-pieces both bold and compelling. Abstract in style, there are many images within each painting for viewers to discover. Each is different depending on the experience and minds’ eye of those who take the time to study these works of art.

Clint Webb, painter: Watercolors are Webb's medium and his paintings evoke a sense of calmness and quiet beauty. Landscapes are often the focus of his works, especially scenes from his many travels in Europe. From his travel photos, he takes pleasure in putting brush to paper to create a "painterly" effect.

Northwest Native Art on Exhibit at Jefferson Museum

Persistent Vision: Northwest Native Art is open at the Jefferson Museum of Art and History, a branch of the Jefferson County Historical Society (JCHS). entitled *Mystical Journey* for the exhibit logo. Oliver works in cedar, bronze, steel, and glass and has public works installed in the United States, Canada, Japan, and Italy.

Contemporary pieces on display include carvings by Joe Ives (Little Boston S’Klallam), painter and carver Bill Martin (Makah), and pieces by carver Dusty Humphries from the “House of Myths” carving shed on the Jamestown S’Klallam tribal campus in Sequim. Contemporary baskets by Cathy Macgregor (Jamestown S’Klallam) are shown along with older traditional baskets.

“This exhibit gives us an opportunity to show some of the wonderful things we have in our collection,” said Becky Schurmann, JCHS collection manager and exhibit designer. “Some of the items were collected by early settlers such as N.D. Hill, Lucinda Hastings, and James G. Swan. Swan was on a collecting trip in 1883 for the newly formed Smithsonian Museum when he met Charles Edensaw, a Haida master carver whose work has never been surpassed.” The cane Swan bought from Edensaw for his personal collection is in the exhibit.

Editor’s comment: The “House of Myths” carving shed is located across the Highway from the 7 Cedars Casino in Sequim. The carvers are working most days except Sundays, and viewers may watch them at work.



PLVC Meeting Report

The May Port Ludlow Village Council (PLVC) meeting was called to order by President Mike Nilssen at 3:00 p.m. at the Beach Club. Directors present were Bill Dean, Linda Haskin, Doug Huber, Laury Hunt, Larry Nobles, Caleb Summerfelt, and Terry Umbreit. A quorum was declared and the agenda was adopted with changes. The approval of the April minutes was postponed and Dean presented the emergency preparedness report. Frenzl represented the South Bay Community association (SBCA). The meeting was not recorded.

Haskin was nominated to be the secretary-treasurer for the next term. The appointment was approved by the council.

Citizen Comments: Lydia Kelley, Timberton Village, asked about comments at the recent commissioner's meeting. She asked, "Are the citizens responsible for the logging in Port Ludlow?" Nilssen answered that they were not.

Community Reports

Jefferson County: Commissioner Kathleen Kler reported that there were three important occurrences in the county. She said that supplemental funds may be available for some projects. Jefferson County is a popular tourist destination based on its agriculture, parks, and traditions. This has brought money into the county in the form of sales and tax revenue.

On the other hand, there continue to be problems, particularly in the west end. Undi road has dropped 15 feet. It is the single access to the homes of several families and will need rerouting. This is a priority project and an ongoing concern.

The county has conferred with FEMA about the new flood plain designation. People living in that area will get consideration.

Asked about the Chimacum school levy, Kler said that the ballots had been reviewed. The levy failed by 44 votes. There will not be sufficient change in a recount to pass.

She also responded to questions about the controversial logging. She said that it took place to provide income for projects in the community. A mediation session will take place on May 20 without HCV Pacific Partners CEO Randy Verrue attending. The parties have agreed on a forester to help expedite the process.

Ryan Mowrey has been hired to handle the property development in the Village Center and in Olympic Terrace II.

Secretary's Report: The March meeting minutes were approved. Approval of the minutes for the April meeting was postponed.

Treasurer’s Report: Total current assets are \$35,778. The PLVC holds funds for the Trails committee of \$9,829. Expenditures included paying part of the cost of the bus for the trip to the commissioner’s meeting and the monthly check to the *Port Ludlow Voice*.

The second insurer solicited declined service. Haskin suggested that the council renew the current insurance as backup. Then they should consider contracting with Insurance Services Group. The insurance companies they represent are respected and the service is less than half the price of the current provider (\$1,397 compared to \$4,000 for comparable service).

Communication Committee: Several notices have been received. Jefferson Healthcare invites the public to the groundbreaking ceremony (see above). The Garden Club has completed its spring clean-up of the native garden. The Festival by the Bay has been canceled.

Trails Committee: Chair Larry Scott sent a message indicating that trails has performed its spring maintenance. It has obtained full approval for the Osprey trail.

Health and Wellness: The committee is seeking a new chair. The current chair needs to step down due to health issues.

Emergency Preparation: Chair Rob Stern hosted a presentation on earthquakes. It was attended by 150 people. Dean opined that the attendance indicates community interest the council should attempt to build on.

PLDD Updates

The Port Ludlow Drainage District (PLDD) was formed in 2002 to resolve storm water drainage problems on common property within the North Bay area that had not been planned for by the developer. Since its inception, there have been over 17 projects completed, and 29 areas within community property are maintained by the District. In the past few months, a lot of work has been done on a Capital Project for Cascade Lane's storm water abatement.

The PLDD and County often collaborate on projects, and property owners need to allow water to flow through ditches and culverts and not fill them in for parking or landscaping. Work is being done to clarify responsibilities involving the PLDD, Jefferson County, and individual property owners regarding drainage issues in North Bay. This is especially important now as the PLDD has completed all Capital Projects in the original Comprehensive Plan of 2003, and the District is reverting to being a public agency focusing on maintenance rather than construction.

The PLDD's website pldd.org contains the Comprehensive Plan, project information and meeting minutes past and present, so anyone can access and learn about our local drainage district and its activities. Meetings are held on the second Thursday of each month in the Bay View room of the Beach Club at 10:00 a.m. and everyone is welcome.

SBCA Meeting Highlights

The regular monthly meeting of the South Bay Community Association (SBCA) was held at the Bay Club on May 6 at 9:30 a.m. with President Gil Skinner presiding. All association directors were present (Skinner, Frenzl, Quail, Jurca, Loomis, Ponto, and Henderson). The agenda was approved by the board before proceeding.

Approval of Prior Minutes:

The minutes of April 1 were corrected to reflect that a letter written to the EVHOA and received by SBCA was from Sue Oemichen, not the EVHOA. Both the corrected minutes and the minutes from the April 21, 2016 Special Meeting were approved.

President's Report: Many members of the South Bay Community traveled to the recent board of commissioners' meeting in Port Townsend where they delivered a petition with an excess of 800 signatures to the board. The petition was to indicate to the board that interest in the clear-cut issue which arose last year was still very much on the minds of the residents of Port Ludlow. Hopefully, this action will give incentive for the board and Jefferson County to rejoin the effort to address this issue.

Manager's Report: Torres requested help from any retired military personnel in the community to help organize and lead the Memorial Day Flag Retirement Ceremony. He noted that in the past, member Jerry Conover had assisted in setting up the ceremony. This year's ceremony will be dedicated to Jerry who passed away.

Torres commented that in a recent meeting with Diana Smeland regarding the assessment on all properties in the South Bay, she indicated that Port Ludlow Associates (PLA) will most likely be paying the special assessments by choosing the \$50 per quarter, per lot option.

Projects undertaken in the last month were:

- The gutter downspouts and tight-lines were cleaned out last month. The curtain drain was located, mapped, and cleaned out. All drainage lines with exception to one are now known, documented, and cleaned out, with a

preventative maintenance plan to keep them in good working order.

- The center treadmill is back in operation.
- HVAC contractor AirFlo conducted an audit to provide a bid for service contract. Many serious issues with the system were found. All items were repaired. The system had been working at approximately 20 per cent of normal.

On behalf of the association, Torres thanked Bert Loomis for locating and mapping out the curtain drain which has now been cleaned out and is in working order. He also thanked Jim Nickless for the help he has provided on the sound system.

Treasurer's Report:

Treasurer Dan Quail submitted written reports for both March and April (2016). For complete details refer to those reports.

Quail's report reflected SBCA had total current assets of \$1,118,114.39 and total fixed assets of \$23,240.49 as of April 30. As of March 31, SBCA had total current assets of \$437,083.96 and total fixed assets of \$23,240.49.

In March, \$7,777.10 of member assessments was transferred to reserves. The total operating account balance (business checking and money market) was \$14,664.19. Total reserve account balances on March 31 were \$464,279.40 including renovation and special assessment. Operating expenses in March were \$41,964.98. Reserve expenses in March were \$7,324.91.

In April \$5,550.00 of Member Assessments were transferred to reserves. As of April, operating account balances totaled \$77,849.29. Total operating funds were \$77,849.29.

As of April 30 other SBCA bank account balances were: \$15,104.50 (Kitsap Bank Renovation Account), \$160,267 (Sound Bank Special Assessment Account), and \$5000 (Kitsap Bank Benevolent Account). The total reserves

including the renovation account held \$420,814.33. Total reserves including special assessment and the benevolent fund contained \$586,082.35.

Operating expenses for April were \$48,138.59. There were no reserve expenses in April.

Bank statements are received after board meetings. Balances do not include interest earned in April. Cash balance sheets and income and expense report are contained in the written report and will be reflected on the SBCA members website.

Quail commented on proposed budget increases for the fiscal year 2016/2017. He outlined the proposals for a 5 percent dues increase, associate member fees, capital contributions, and moneys for club services. The dues increase would amount to \$40 per member or \$10 per quarter. The report was approved by the board.

Board Communications

The board received one communication from member Dan Meade.

Committee Reports

Architectural Review Committee (ARC): Jurca reported the ARC Committee is still working on design standard and technology issues for roofing materials. The use of new plastic-based materials will be reviewed.

Two ARC workshops were held. Sheila Twohey resigned from the committee. Additional material from the Loomis complaint concerning trees on a neighboring lot will be examined.

Facilities Committee: Loomis reported that the tight lines and gutter drains had been located and cleaned in the past month. An HVAC maintenance contract is being sought. The repair project is moving forward.

Loomis and Torres met with Sound Bank's appraiser two weeks ago and expect the appraisal to be completed and submitted to the bank within two weeks. Loomis, Torres, and Pat Hall are reviewing contracts, material specifications, and drawings with the Lentz-Ryan team. Director Jurca is reviewing the Lentz-Ryan contracts as well.

Finance Committee: Quail commented on issues dealing with credit card/debit payments. He said that in the past several years, costs pertaining to the running and maintenance of the Bay Club have continuously increased while the income has not. During those years, residual funds have carried most of the budget increases. The residual from last year's budget which was \$56,000 is now down to \$16,000. He said a 5 percent increase in annual dues will be necessary to maintain quality service to the membership.

Additionally, Quail mentioned the necessity of providing additional liability insurance relating to the ownership of the trails in South Bay. An amount of \$10,000 was to be placed in the budget for potential legal/litigation matters.

Several changes were made in the wording of Bay Club Policies and Procedures, removing the paragraph relating to purpose (Policy #1.J) and adding wording to the Communications section for associate members. The sentence would now read "90 days past due: send notice of termination under new agreement of associate members" was made by Jurca and seconded by Loomis. The motion carried 7/0.

Long Range Planning Committee: A letter of resignation was received from Jane Armstrong.

AD HOC Timber: Jurca commented on the demonstration at the board of Commissioners meeting last week saying that it appeared to have gained their attention. Mediation is still going forward on the tree cutting issue with PLA and Jefferson County. The two parties have met once in mediation during the past year. A second mediation session is scheduled on May 20 in Seattle.

Port Ludlow Village Council (PLVC): Skinner commented that PLA has announced plans to build a model home in Olympic Terrace II. (See the PLVC pages in this issue for a full report.)

New Business

Revisions to SBCA Policy and Procedure Manual outline were discussed. A simplified method of numbering the general rules and policies was presented (section 3.008.000 protocol for recording of SBCA Board of Director meetings deleted).

Charters for the following SBCA committees were before the board of directors for approval: Finance Committee, Facilities Committee, Human Relations Committee, Human Relations Complaint process, Human Relations Benevolence Committee, and the Communications Committee. The charters of the committees were subsequently accepted as written.

Revisions to the associate member contract were adopted. A new committee, Activities and Amenities, was formed.

A written rental unit policy was presented. A discussion regarding a need for further information to be gathered regarding who is authorized to utilize the club, owner/renter ended with withdrawal of the motion; the issue was tabled.

Skinner noted the Ludlow Maintenance Commission (LMC) has invited SBCA members to a BBQ and picnic at the Beach Club on **Saturday, July 30**.

A discussion was held regarding potentially adding a certified personal trainer to staff to be utilized for orientation of members for fitness center equipment.

Bay Club Repair Project Update

Shortly after the March 19 special assessment vote to fund the Bay Club repair, South Bay Community Association (SBCA) General Manager Mark Torres, South Bay resident and retired architect Pat Hall, and SBCA board member Bert Loomis met with the Lentz-Ryan team. The group toured the building exterior to refine the scope of work and evaluate material options, construction timelines, and other details. Lentz has submitted its proposed contract, which is being reviewed by SBCA board member Dave Jurca.

Torres and Loomis met with Sound Bank's appraiser in April, and provided him with building blueprints and replacement cost information, along with a significant amount of supporting documents (aerial photos, zoning, availability of sewer and water, etc). Torres also provided a tour of the Bay Club including the surrounding 11.12 acres. Loomis expected the appraisal to be submitted to the bank within two weeks of the meeting.

The Bay Club team planned to meet with the architect on May 10, where, at the time of writing, Loomis expected the contract would be signed and the final building specifications and blueprints would be reviewed and approved by the Bay Club team. The documents are then to be submitted to Jefferson County. The process should take approximately three weeks from beginning to end.

Loomis expects a final contract from Ryan Construction to be submitted and approved promptly. The bank loan should be approved by the first week in June. Depending on the weather and availability of the subcontractor's construction team, work could begin by mid-June with an estimated completion date of late September.

The Outstanding Achievement Awards for 2015 were presented this April at the Jefferson County Board of Health meeting to recognize 21 restaurants, full-service food establishments, and their proprietors for demonstrating the highest standards of safe food handling during the past year.

The 21 restaurants and proprietors worked hard in 2015 to maintain excellent food safety standards. Most of the recognized establishments work with complex menus which adds to food safety challenges. Jefferson County Public Health (JCPH) and the Board of Health recognized them for their dedication to preventing illness and encouraged the entire food industry to strive for the same honor.

Outstanding achievement award winners were: Blue Moose Uptown Pub & Grill, Brinnon School District, Brinnon Senior Supper Club, Chimacum Primary School, Chimacum High School, Chimacum Middle School, Discovery View Retirement Association, Ferino's Pizzeria, Food Co-op Deli, Grant Street School, Jefferson County Jail, Jefferson Mental Health, Lanza's, Port Townsend Senior Nutrition, Quilcene School Cafeteria, QFC#106 Deli - Port Townsend, QFC # 870 Deli - Port Hadlock, Tri-Area Community Center Senior Nutrition / Meal, The Tin Brick, Timberhouse Restaurant, and Velocity Coffee Ltd.

Criteria for the award were developed by the JCPH Food Safety Roundtable and Jefferson County Food Safety staff, and are based on food safety inspections conducted in the areas of personal hygiene, food temperature safety, and prevention from contamination. All food workers must hold a current Washington State Food Worker Card.

Plan to Buy KPLU Investigated

Seattle Times reporter Lewis Lamb has revealed details of an agreement for the University of Washington's public radio station KUOW to buy Tacoma-based KPLU from Pacific Lutheran University (PLU). The report appeared in the *Seattle Times* (May 15). It charges that UW communications executive Norm Arkans and General Manager and KUOW president Caryn Mathes conspired to keep the deal quiet until just before the meeting in which the regents approved the purchase.

A petition sent to the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) by Carol MacKinnon, attorney and long-time KPLU supporter challenged the deal. Mackinnon claims that a 1974 Supreme Court ruling states that “when public notice is required, that notice must not be misleading.” She says the wording of the notice was “gauzy” and violates Washington’s open meeting act.

Documents related to the sale indicate that PLU initiated the deal with KUOW. The motive according to the Sound Public Governing board was to obtain funds and “to get out of the audio content business.” However, PLU did not want to sound “callous.” KUOW looked favorably on the purchase because it would eliminate direct competition and contribute to building a Seattle superstation.

If KUOW were to buy KPLU for the \$8 million purchase price, it would eliminate much of the listeners’ favorite programming. KPLU’s community advisory board opposes the sale. Recently a community group called “Friends of 88.5 FM” has been allowed to bid on the station. It must raise the \$7 million by **June 30**. So far it has raised \$5.9 million and submitted a letter of intent. It is seeking more donations. UW continues to seek FCC approval to take over KPLU’s broadcast license. PLU has the discretion to accept or reject offers.




