The Sky Up There: Summer Star Parties

For anyone interested in looking at several planets and a number of other deep sky objects, July, August, and September offer a rare opportunity to do so. On **July 16**, and again on **August 19** and **September 19**, The Inn At Port Ludlow is hosting star parties for both novice and experienced observers to enjoy. This summer is marked by oppositions with Mars, Jupiter, and Saturn. In simplest terms, it means that those three and the Earth are on the same side of the Sun. It also means that the planets are about as close to the Earth as they ever get. That doesn't mean they are close, it just means they're closer. Mars, for example, will be a mere 39 million miles away. Not exactly a next-door neighbor, that would be the Moon, but at least on the same block. Jupiter will also be close, but since it's significantly farther from the Sun than Earth at its closest, it will still be about 300 million miles away. Saturn, too, will be much closer to the Earth, but still more than 450 million miles distant. If that sounds like a lot, consider this: the distance to the closest star to Earth other than our Sun is Proxima Centauri, some 4.2 light years away. In miles, we're talking a mere 25 trillion. After that, the distances to other stars get pretty large. As for the distances between galaxies, the nearest one, the beautiful Andromeda galaxy, measures about 2.6 million light-years distant. In miles, that's a number too big to contemplate.

In any event, the July star party holds promise for some spectacular sights, especially Jupiter and Saturn. First, they're very big planets: Jupiter measures about 82,000 miles in diameter; Saturn is a close second at about 78,000 miles with its spectacular rings. Through a telescope Jupiter's atmosphere displays dramatic bands and a glimpse of four of its biggest moons. Saturn with its rings is a breath-taking sight, no matter how many times one sees it. Mars, by comparison, is a very small planet at 4,000 miles in diameter. But because it's so much closer, it appears almost as big as Jupiter in a telescope. With good "seeing," one might glimpse a polar cap, or even dark surface features. No Martian cities, but a good view nevertheless.

Each star party will also offer views of the "Ring Nebula" and the "Dumbbell Nebula" in our own galaxy, the globular star cluster in Hercules, and the beautiful Andromeda Galaxy among others.

As with any enterprise there is a risk. Telescopes can't see through clouds any more than the human eye can. So, if it's cloudy, we're out of luck. But if it's not...

One interesting fact: the pupil in your eye is about a quarter of an inch in diameter, whereas the mirror in the star party telescope measures eight inches in diameter, 32 times the diameter of your pupil. For that reason, the mirror gathers a thousand times more light than the human eye. So, while the average person can see bright planets and about 2,000 stars from a single location on a clear night, with a two-inch telescope one can see 300,000. Through an eight-inch telescope one begins to count, not in stars, but in galaxies, numbering into the thousands. Join us for an evening you won't soon forget!

Local Summer Activities for Children

Keeping children active is the secret to successful summer vacations or visits to their grandparents' homes. By planning ahead, parents and grandparents can find child-friendly local destinations and activities.

Step into U.S. military history at Fort Flagler Historical State Park on the northern tip of Marrowstone Island. Tour and explore a significant coastal defense fort established more than a century ago to guard the entrance to Puget Sound. Fort Flagler activities include picnicking, hiking, boating, kite-flying, beach exploration, saltwater fishing, bird watching, clam digging, and crabbing. Experienced paragliders can bring their wings and ride thermals up to stupendous aerial views. parks.state.wa.us/508/Fort-Flagler.

Visit Point No Point Light Station. It's the site of the oldest lighthouse on Puget Sound and located in Hansville on a point of land that the local Native American tribes had given the name Hahd-skus, meaning long nose. You can fish from the lighthouse beach, pnplighthouse.com/Home. There is also fishing from the dock at Teal Lake in Port Ludlow and in the back-right corner of Sequim Bay State Park. parks.state.wa.us/582/Sequim-Bay.

Tour Quilcene National Fish Hatchery. It's on the east side of Washington's Olympic Peninsula on Highway 101, two miles south of Quilcene. They raise Coho salmon for on-station release and provide Coho salmon eggs and fingerlings for tribal programs. fws.gov/quilcenenfh.

Go to the Jefferson County Library in Port Hadlock. Events and story times at area libraries are free. jclibrary.info, or visit the Port Townsend Library, ptpubliclibrary.org.

Keyport U.S. Naval Undersea Museum is the only official Navy museum that interprets all of the Navy's undersea activities. They hold the country's most comprehensive collection of U.S. Navy artifacts, documents, and reference material related to undersea subjects, and are renowned for several specialty collections. Significant artifacts are on display in the museum's 18,000 square foot exhibition hall. history.navy.mil/content/history/museums/undersea.html.

A hike down to Fallsview Canyon on the Big Quilcene River takes you to white water rapids, a spectacular waterfall across the canyon, and a nook in the river that serves as a popular swimming hole for teens, wta.org/go-hiking/hikes/fallsview-canyon-1. Other great hikes are listed at the Washington Trails Association website. wta.org.

Walk to the totem pole, beyond The Inn At Port Ludlow and along the beach below. Go out on Port Ludlow Marina's A and B Docks to view sea anemones, sea urchins, loons, blue herons, gulls, kingfishers, eagles, starfish, crabs, jellyfish and otters.

Visit the Port Townsend Marine Science Center which has exhibits of touchable tide pool creatures. ptmsc.org.

Take a ferry and see the islands. Travel to the San Juan Islands on Puget Sound Express, the official passenger ferry route from Port Townsend to Friday Harbor. From there you can connect on Washington State Ferries to other islands. Puget Sound Express also offers Guaranteed Whale Watching Tours. There is nothing like seeing whales with your own eyes. pugetsoundexpress.com.

Take a farm tour: Finnriver Farm and Cidery, finnriv-erfarm.com; Solstice Farm Bed & Breakfast, solstic-efarmstay.com; Mount Townsend Creamery, mttownsend-creamery.com; Mystery Bay Farm, mysterybayfarm.com.

Rent a cabin. There are nice newer cabins on the Makah Reservation near Neah Bay. hobuckbeachresort.com. The cabins in the RV Park are right on the Pacific Ocean. Fishing and surfing is available.

The farthest northwest tip of the contiguous United States, Cape Flattery, provides a dramatic backdrop to a surprisingly accessible hike. It's managed by the Makah Tribe, who provide permits for parking at Washburn's General Store, the Makah Museum, and many other locations in Neah Bay. wta.org/go-hiking/hikes/cape-flattery.

Wheel-In Motor Movie, Port Townsend, operating since 1953, is one of only five drive-in movie theatres left in Washington State. *FM Dolby Digital Stereo Sound* and *Classic Drive-In Speakers* are provided in the lot. Now open Friday thru Sunday. Box Office Opens: 8:00 p.m. Show Time - Dusk. ptwheelinmotormovie.com.

Ken's Gardening Corner

For those of us who are vegetable gardening enthusiasts, the fruits of our labor over these previous months should start paying off right about now. In our own garden, we are enjoying a bumper crop of Romaine and Merlot lettuce, spinach, artichokes, snow peas, and snap peas, as well as the first tomatoes and peppers in the greenhouse. It doesn't stop here though; in the coming weeks it is a good time to start planning out your fall garden. Some of the vegetables started from seed should include beets, broccoli, cabbage, carrots, Chinese cabbage, collards, kale, kohlrabi, head lettuce, leaf lettuce, rutabaga, and Swiss chard. Before we go any farther though, I want to talk about a few potential garden problems, as all of these can multiply in the summer heat. Blossom end rot in tomatoes is caused by calcium deficiency that's aggravated by inconsistent soil moisture such as alternating moist and dry conditions. Defeat the problem by mulching plants and keeping soil consistently moist. The best control for hollyhock rust is keeping a clean garden. Remove and destroy affected leaves. Do not compost them. Apply slug bait for slugs and snails in shady areas of the garden. Increase success rates by sprinkling bait under stones, near foundations or sheds, and along path edges. And finally, watch for spider mites. Spider mites can quickly overtake plants when weather is hot and dry. Quick, daily sprays of water on shrubs can keep populations under control.

Dahlias are one of the most profusely flowering plants in the garden right now, but in order to keep them going for a long season, it's critical to remove spent flowers regularly. By taking off the old blooms, you send a signal to the plant that the season is not yet over. To deadhead, just trim each spent flower back to the main stem. When all of the flowers on a stem have finished, cut the stem back to a set of leaves so the dahlia will continue putting out fresh, new growth. Roses are commonly attacked by a number of fungal diseases, including black spot, powdery mildew, and rust. The best way to help your roses fight disease is to keep them strong. Make sure they have good growing conditions and ample moisture and nutrients. Remove dead foliage from your rose garden too; it can spread disease.

Fish emulsion applied as a liquid fertilizer when buds are about pea-size (about three weeks before each bloom cycle) will enhance bloom color. Add chelated iron for rich green foliage. Well, that’s it for this month. “Eat Healthy, and Happy Gardening.”

Irondale - What Next?

In a *Voice* article in October 2017, background information was provided to bring you current in the status of the iron and steel mills of Irondale. What is in the future for this bygone industrial dream on the Olympic Peninsula? History and personal lives shout from every remnant of the old town. While the jail has fallen into disrepair, supported only by the two front corners, it has much to tell about the one drunk prisoner it held and the various uses (cow sheds and chicken coops) it has provided to the townspeople of Irondale.

The buried foundations of the steel mill are still there, though protected from abuse by the caps completed by the Department of Ecology in their cleanup of the contamination found in 2005. During low tide you can see the remains of pilings where Crown-Zellerbach operated a log sorting yard, now managed by the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife. This property will continue protecting Chimacum Creek for future runs of Coho and chum salmon.

What about Irondale Beach County Park? Currently, folks from Port Ludlow, Port Townsend, and Irondale, under the direction of Matt Tyler, Jefferson County Parks and Recreation Manager, are part of a rehabilitation team bringing Irondale Beach County Park back to life. They devote many hours replacing weeds with various native plants such as Indian plum and shore pine.


Because of the tremendous historical significance of Irondale Beach County Park (and its great natural resources

in both seashore and upland forest), an interconnecting interpretive trails system will be constructed to provide the most enjoyable experience possible. More visibility will hopefully decrease the graffiti defacement by vandals. Interpretive signs will touch on the important aspects of the iron and steel operation. Eventually, a display of artifacts found at the park will be constructed for visitors to better understand the product of the iron mill – pig iron ingots and a section of rail track are two of the key items that will be on display. The industrial site of Irondale may emerge again as an educational experience for local, state, and national visitors. It is truly a very unique resource that has a tremendous future.

Meet Barbara Berthiaume

When Barbara Berthiaume walks into a room, the burst of energy is palpable. Acknowledging her highly active lifestyle with a modest smile, she lists her extensive community service activities – not only in Port Ludlow but Jefferson County and beyond – as though it’s the norm for retirees.

Recognition for her extraordinary service recently came in the form of the Annual Heart of Service Award sponsored by the Peninsula Daily News and three Rotary Clubs: the Noon and the Sunrise clubs in Port Townsend and the East Jefferson group. Barbara was quoted in the newspaper as saying that volunteers serve their communities “for a

lot of reasons. It gives us a sense of purpose and a social connection. All of the people I've met through volunteering have been wonderful and inspiring and have become best friends. It makes us better versions of ourselves."

Barbara's service activities include writing for the *Voice*; serving on the board of the Jefferson County Hospice Foundation's education committee; co-chairing the Olympic Peninsula chapter of the Boeing Bluebills; and participating in a wide variety of Bluebills projects. A dedicated golfer, she co-chairs the group's annual golf tournament fundraiser for Dove House and also serves in a number of capacities at the agency. In addition, Barbara is involved with a new 501(c)(3), Peninsula Support Organization (PSO), which partners with the Bluebills and the Museum of Flight to raise funds for STEM programs on the Peninsula.

Barbara had started her career in social work before earning a Master of Social Welfare degree from the University of Washington. Then she moved to Paris with her husband, Ed, who worked in customer relations for Boeing. During their 26 years overseas, she focused on addressing needs that she saw in the expatriate communities wherever they lived: first in France, then London, Singapore, and a second stint in London.

"Some people don't adapt well to a new culture," she noted, so she created a workshop to help relocated families learn how to deal with transition and change. "Companies provide support to their employees when they send them on long-term assignments," Barbara says, "but their help doesn't include the emotional impact of moving so far away from home. People can adjust more easily if they have the information they need."

Her speaking business grew more quickly than expected due to the widespread need. The transitions workshop became a train-the-trainer program in London as demand grew and some of her students became interested in leading classes themselves. Later, Barbara co-developed a card game for the entire family entitled, *Your Move!* The emotional aspect of transition also is the topic when she speaks at the annual Fulbright Orientation for U.S. and U.K. scholars.

Other fill-the-need projects include co-writing a workbook for children on counseling skills that's been translated into numerous languages; a workshop to help people suffering from trauma; and a program to support both the parents of, and children with, special needs.


After the Berthiaumes returned to the U.S. in 2004 when Ed retired, they looked for a place to settle. When they visited friends, who had built a home in Port Ludlow, they

decided to follow suit. Both Ed and Barbara soon became involved in the Bluebills. He chaired the group for a few years and now coordinates Kitsap County service activities for World Vision.

One of her first projects was creating Port Ludlow's annual "Welcome to the Neighborhood" event, scheduled this year for July 11 at the Bay Club. A more recent creation is based on personal experience.

"Can It Happen Again?" has been presented to Dine & Discover and community groups, such as Rotary clubs and schools. It relates the experiences of American citizens of Japanese descent who were incarcerated by the U.S. government during World War II. Barbara's own family spent several years in detention camps, first in Montana, where she was born, and then in Idaho, where she grew up. "Younger generations had been pushing for an accurate account of the detention centers and what happened to the people in them," she says.

Like her other programs, this latest one responds to a need, making Barbara's career-to-retirement transition appear to be seamless. It's been a dynamic, steady stream of projects in service to others.

Anderson Lake Closed Due to Toxin

High levels of the potent nerve toxin anatoxin-a were detected in a water sample taken from Anderson Lake, Chimacum, on Tuesday, May 29. The toxin level was 112 micrograms per liter, which is above the Washington State recreational criteria of one microgram per liter. The bloom of blue-green algae (also known as cyanobacteria) in the lake contains several toxin-producing species of algae, including *Dolichospermum* (formerly *Anabaena*). Anatoxin-a can result in illness and death in people and animals. Washington State Parks has closed the lake for recreation including fishing, boating, and swimming. Visitors are also urged to keep pets out of the water. The rest of Anderson Lake State Park remains open for hiking, biking, and horseback riding. Algae blooms have also appeared this year in Lake Leland and Gibbs Lake, but toxins have not been detected at either of those lakes so far.


Genealogy: Beyond the Basics

Garwood Book at Jefferson Museum

On **Sunday, July 8**, at 2:00 pm, former Port Townsend resident, artist Galen Garwood, will read from his newly released book, *Sell the Monkey, a Memoir*, at the City Council Chambers above the Jefferson Museum of Art & History, located at 540 Water Street in Port Townsend.

Garwood is a prolific artist who works in many mediums. In the early 70s, when he arrived in Seattle, he was exhibiting his paintings at the Foster/White Gallery. In 1976, he won First Place in Painting at the Pacific Northwest Annual Exhibition.

Garwood was drawn to Port Townsend in 1982 by Centrum's newly established Fine Art Print Center. During his twenty years here, Garwood's work expanded to include print making, poetry, writing, multi-media, and film. His multi-media piece *Adagio* was included in the 1996 Venice Biennale's Xenograhia, Nomadic Wall.

Rescue, Chief Jim Walkowski and Lieutenant Curtis Sanders. East Jefferson Fire Rescue Assistant Chief Ted Krysinski was the Incident Commander for the exercise.

Wildland Firefighter “Red Card” certifications were earned by three firefighters from East Jefferson Fire Rescue, six from Port Ludlow Fire and Rescue, and one from Quilcene Fire Rescue. Red Cards are used by state, federal, and other fire agencies that work cooperatively with the National Wildfire Coordinating Group (NWCG) and are issued to individuals who have met the qualifications used on a wildland fire incident.

Wildfire predictions for 2018 in the Pacific Northwest are somewhat mixed. According to the National Interagency Fire Center, “The El Niño-Southern Oscillation (ENSO) remains neutral—neither in an El Niño or La Niña phase. Warmer temperatures and lower precipitation than normal for the Pacific Northwest are expected **July** through **September** 2018.” gacc.nifc.gov/nwcc/content/products/fwx/MonthlySeasonal.pdf.

Wildland Firefighting Exercise

Fifty-four personnel from seven agencies participated in a wildland firefighting exercise on June 2 in Port Ludlow. This was the tenth year this type of training has been made available here on the Olympic Peninsula and the fourth year it was held in Port Ludlow. This type of interagency training provides a valuable opportunity for agencies to work together and develop good communication skills between agencies.

Firefighters from Port Ludlow Fire and Rescue; East Jefferson Fire Rescue; Quilcene Fire and Rescue; Brinnon Fire Department; and Discovery Bay Fire Department were instructed in multiple evolutions to include fire line construction, progressive hose lays, fire shelter deployment, firefighting aircraft ground operations, and securing a water supply utilizing portable pumps in the daylong exercise. A live fire prescribed burn utilizing various firing devices concluded the day.

A new element was added to the exercise this year involving communication with the Department of Natural Resources Dispatch Center in Forks and provided an opportunity for five new dispatch operators to experience the types of resources that could be requested during a wildland fire.

Instructors for the exercise included Eric Flannigan from the Department of Natural Resources, Quilcene Assistant Chief Don Svetich, Lieutenant Wicus McGuffey, Port Ludlow Fire and Rescue, and from East Jefferson Fire

May’s Rabid Bat Stats Highest in 20 Years

Olympia – Since May 1, four bats found in Washington have tested positive for rabies, the highest number identified in the state in the month of May since 1998. The Washington State Department of Health (DOH) reminds people to call their local health department if they, a family member, or a pet interacts with a bat. Touching a bat could expose you to rabies.

Health officials routinely test for and find rabid bats, typically during the summer months. DOH wants the public to continue to take appropriate precautions if a bat – dead or alive – is found. Try to avoid contact with bats and other wild animals; do not touch a bat if possible. If you do have contact with a bat or suspect that a family member or pet had contact with a bat, try to safely capture it, keep it contained away from people, and call your local health department for next steps.

It is also important to protect your pets by ensuring their rabies vaccinations are current. More detailed precautions and information can be found on the Washington State Department of Health website, doh.wa.gov.

Replacement Capital Projects Levy

Note: This is the explanation of the upcoming levy by Superintendent Rick Thompson of Chimacum Schools given at the Port Ludlow Village Council and South Bay Community Association meetings in June. The election date will be August 7.

In 2012, Chimacum School District voters approved a 6-year Capital Projects Levy at \$1,325,000 per year with collections 2013 - 2018.

Chimacum is now requesting voters to approve a replacement Capital Projects Levy on **August 7, 2018**, at the same terms: six years, \$1,325,000 per year for collection 2019 - 2024. This request was based upon a facility condition assessment of capital needs due by MENG Analysis.

Some highlights of the levy are as follows:

1. The levy is for six years, \$1,325,000 per year, with a total collection of \$7,950,000.
2. A levy requires “50% plus 1” for passage.
3. This levy is not a bond.
4. The District will use these dollars to continue making facility improvements, focusing on safety, and maintaining the best spaces the district owns.

Why: A full analysis of all district properties was completed last year. See the MENG Summary Report on the website csd49.org for details of all district property, systems, deficiencies, and repair estimates.

Port Ludlow Performing Arts - A Jewel in the Crown

For the last 27 years, Port Ludlow Performing Arts (PLPA) has brought world-class musicians, singers, dancers, ventriloquists, and magicians to our community. The variety of music has been astounding and there is always something to appeal to everyone's taste. Most of our performers have earned numerous music awards, produced multiple CDs, toured all over the United States and, in many cases, have played on famous stages and venues around the world. These performances are the best deal around!

So, you might be wondering how this all happens. How do we get such world-class entertainment in Port Ludlow? Having served on the board for two seasons, I can tell you it only happens through the hard work of the 15-member PLPA Board of Directors, many community volunteers, and generous donations from our community. There are people responsible for recruiting performers, negotiating contracts, ticket sales, publicity, volunteers, community outreach, stage decoration, and much more. This all comes together because of the outstanding leadership of Barb Skinner, the President of PLPA.

Port Ludlow Performing Arts is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization. All proceeds go to performer fees, producing concerts, and improving the musical experience through support of the Bay Club's sound, screen, and lighting systems. Last but not least, we sponsor a music outreach program for Chimacum and Quilcene Schools, grades K through 12.

Since about half of Chimacum school children live below the poverty level, for many of them exposure to the world of music is limited. PLPA's Martha Dawson Fund seeks to support the efforts of the schools to bring musical experiences and opportunities to all their students. The Martha Dawson fund provides musical instrument rentals to needy students in the 5th to 12th grades. Its "Adventures in Music" supports the Port Angeles Symphony to develop three programs a year to take to elementary students.

PLPA also takes one of our regular season concerts to Chimacum High School annually. Under the direction of Cheri Gertstenberger, our Education Outreach Chair, PLPA is always looking for new ways to support the music programs in our public schools.

If you are new to the area or have never had an opportunity to attend one of the PLPA concerts, make this the year to experience one of these outstanding performances. Events at Fort Worden

There are 30 public events happening in July and August at Centrum; 11 are free, which might make it hard to pick which ones to make time for. Choosing the best among some 240 artists, who will sweep through Port Townsend's Fort Worden State Park during that time, may not be easy, but the following is an inside scoop from the staff about who not to miss.

Ever heard of flatfoot buck dancing? Satisfy your curiosity with a performance by Thomas Maupin of Tennessee, whom the National Endowment for the Arts named a National Heritage Fellow for his mastery of the art, which is somewhat related to clogging. Maupin will dance during the Fiddles on the Fourth concert on **Wednesday, July 4**, at the McCurdy Pavilion at 1:30 p.m.

In addition, there is a rare chance to see musicians from the Tejano fiddling genre. Tejanos are Mexican-Americans who live in southern Texas. Fiddler Belen Escobedo is a master of the disappearing art form, and she will be boarding her first plane in order to reach Port Townsend. She and two of her fellow Tejano musicians will play during the Fiddle Tunes Finale on **Saturday, July 7**, at 1:30 p.m.

Following Fiddle Tunes is the Port Townsend Writers Conference. Each night of the conference from **July 15 - 21** features a free reading session from 7:00 to 8:00 p.m. in

the Wheeler Theater. If you can't make them all, carve out these two. First, **Tuesday, July 17**, features Melissa Febos, a former New York dominatrix and author of essays whom *The New Yorker* called "mesmerizing." Second, **Friday, July 20**, features Ilya Kaminsky, who was born in 1977 in Ukraine, a part of the former Soviet Union. He arrived in the United States in 1993 when his family was granted asylum by the government.

The following week welcomes Jazz Port Townsend with artist faculty Jazzmeia Horn and George Cables. Horn is a rising star who won the prestigious Thelonious Monk International Vocal Jazz Competition in 2015. She will perform at the McCurdy Pavilion on **Saturday, July 28**, at 1:30 p.m. or later that same evening during the Jazz in the Clubs concert series in the Fort Worden Chapel.

Cables will be returning as a Jazz Port Townsend faculty member for the 35th time. Cables, 73, has inspired and mentored many workshop participants who later became established musicians. He recently recovered from a surgery to amputate his left leg, but he does not seem to be letting it slow him down.

Cables will perform during Jazz in the Clubs in the Chapel building on **Friday, July 27**, at 10:00 p.m. and then on **Saturday, July 28**, at 7:30 p.m. at the McCurdy Pavilion.

The following week, true blues fans won't want to miss Jontavious Willis, a young up-and-coming star taking a week off the TajMo tour to come to Port Townsend, and Jimmy "Duck" Holmes, a proprietor of one of the oldest juke joints in Mississippi.

Willis grew up singing gospel music at the Mount Pilgrim Baptist Church with his grandfather. At the age of 14, he came across a YouTube video of Muddy Waters playing *Hoochie Coochie Man*, and was hooked. He set his course on the blues, and four years later he was playing on Taj Mahal's stage. Willis will perform **Friday, August 3**, at 8:00 p.m. in Fort Worden's JFK building during the Blues in the Clubs concert series. He will then play **Saturday, August 4**, at 1:30 p.m. in the McCurdy Pavilion and then back in the "clubs" on **Saturday, August 4**, at 9:15 p.m. in the Wheeler Theater.

Holmes is a deep-roots folk blues musician who plays in the blues tradition described as American primitivism, a repetitive and monotone style that is ethereal, gritty, and rough. Holmes' first performance is during the "clubs" series **Friday, August 3**, at 8:00 p.m. at the Wheeler Theater. He will then play **Saturday, August 4**, at 1:30 p.m. in the McCurdy Pavilion and then back in the "clubs" on **Saturday, August 4**, at 9:15 p.m. at Rainshadow Recording Studio within the Fort.

Tickets and information are available at centrum.org. Centrum provides free youth tickets for students aged 18 or younger for all of its concerts.

Free Concert at Fort Flagler

Thursday, July 12, at 7:00 p.m.: Authors Carol Despeaux Fawcett and David Stallings read from their work. Carol Despeaux Fawcett earned her Master of Fine Arts (MFA) degree from Goddard College. She is an award-winning poet whose work has appeared in many journals. Her memoir and her poetry have won first place in the Pacific Northwest Writer's Contest, and her current work-in-progress, a fantasy novel, was a finalist. *The Dragon and the Dragonfly* is her first book of poetry.

David Stallings was born in the U.S. South and raised in Alaska and Colorado before settling in the Pacific Northwest. Once an academic geographer, he has long worked to promote public transportation in the Puget Sound area. His poems have appeared in several North American, United Kingdom, and Swedish literary journals and anthologies, as well as in *Resurrection Bay* (Evening Street Press) and *Risking Delight* (forthcoming, Kelsay Books).

Patricia Henley is the author of three novels, four collections of stories, two chapbooks of poetry, and a stage play. Her first novel *Hummingbird House* was a finalist for the National Book Award and The New Yorker Fiction Prize. Her first collection of stories *Friday Night at Silver Star* won the Montana First Book Award. For 26 years, she taught Creative Writing in the MFA Program at Purdue University. She lives in Frostburg, Maryland.

Shawn Vestal's debut novel *Daredevils* was published in the spring of 2016 by Penguin Press. His collection of short stories *Godforsaken Idaho*, published by New Harvest in April 2013, was named the winner of the PEN/Robert W. Bingham Prize that honors a debut book that "represents distinguished literary achievement and suggests great promise." He also published *A.K.A. Charles Abbott*, a short memoir as a Kindle Single in October 2013. He writes a column for *The Spokesman-Review* in Spokane, Washington, and teaches in the MFA program at Eastern Washington University.

Alexandra Teague was born in Fort Worth, Texas, grew up in Eureka Springs, Arkansas, and has since lived in Missouri, Montana, Florida (where she earned her MFA at the University of Florida in 1998), Hawaii, California, and Idaho. Her first book of poetry *Mortal Geography* (Persea 2010) won the 2009 Lexi Rudnitsky Prize and the 2010 California Book Award. She is an Associate Professor in the University of Idaho's MFA program, faculty advisor for Fugue, and an editor for Broadsided Press. She is also a founding member of the BASK Collective. She lives in Moscow, Idaho, with her husband, the musician and composer Dylan Champagne.

Thursday, July 26, at 7:00 p.m.: Authors Alice Derry and Kathryn Hunt present readings from their works. *Hunger* is Alice Derry's fifth volume of poetry, *Tremolo* received a 2011 Washington Artist Trust Award, and *Strangers To Their Courage* was a finalist for the Washington Book Award. Derry taught English and German at Peninsula College in Port Angeles, Washington, for 29 years, where she co-directed the Foothills Writers' Series. 



The Printmaker's Hand IV

July 5 - 29: Northwind Arts Center and Corvidae Press present “The Printmaker’s Hand IV,” a juried show of contemporary prints.

Fine prints are not reproductions, but individual works of art transferred to paper either by a press or by hand. Some techniques allow multiple editions to be made while others, such as monoprint, are a single unique image like a painting. The process allows artists to create everything

from detailed realistic images to subtle abstract and impressionistic works.

Juror Bob Kochs selected works from 31 artists across the western states including Washington, Oregon, California, and Alaska. The 45 pieces in this show represent both traditional techniques such as woodcut and etching to more modern forms such as collagraph, monoprint and serigraph.

Bob Kochs is the founder and owner of the Augen Gallery in Portland, Oregon, which is known for its representation of contemporary regional printmakers as well as works of major American and European artists such as David Hockney, Robert Motherwell, and Frank Stella.

Village Council June Meeting Summary

The following is a recap of the Port Ludlow Village Council (PLVC) meeting minutes. The full minutes are available for review on plvc.org.

President Bill Dean reminded everyone that the Emergency Management Fair would be held on Saturday, June 23, from 8:15 a.m. until 1:00 p.m. at the Beach Club. The theme of the event is “Camping in Your Home in a Time of Disaster.” Everyone is encouraged to attend this annual event.

County Commissioner Kate Dean reported on several legislative items that were considered and/or passed by the state legislature this year. She noted that everyone probably recognized an increase in property tax this year due to the McCleary decision which increased education funding to bring this important mandate in line with the state’s constitution. She also reminded everyone that while the federal government had determined that net neutrality was up for debate, the State of Washington legislated that net neutrality was to be protected.

Among other topics, Ms. Dean discussed the phasing out of Atlantic salmon net pens, the Department of Natural Resources state trust lands transfers, Orca population studies, and the county roads.

Superintendent of Chimacum Schools, Rick Thompson, gave an overview of the proposed tax levy which will be on the August primary ballot. Mr. Thompson stressed that this levy is a replacement levy and would be used for painting, carpeting, security, and technology. This levy is for the same term and same amount of the existing levy.

The landscaping has begun on the Jefferson Healthcare (JHC) building in front of the garage grate as proposed by JHC at their March 29 Port Ludlow community meeting to unveil the building improvements.

The Treasurer’s report was reviewed and showed a beginning balance of \$28,299.17 with a net income of \$420. Expenses totaled \$1,727 which left an ending balance of \$27,712.17.

Emergency Management Welcomes New CERT Coordinator and Leadership Team

I've learned a lot in the past year since joining the PLVC-EM Team. Though, my learning curve is still pretty steep. It's like a perpetual expedition; you find a nugget of knowledge here, a "treasure map" of logistics there, and discover so many amazing people. It's what makes this effort so meaningful, and fun, like when I stumbled upon CERT.

"What's a CERT?" I asked my PLVC-EM colleague, Pat Lohrey, following a series of new emergency prep friends proudly telling me they were CERT. What I learned is that we should all be proud!

CERT is a FEMA Citizen Emergency Response Team that's uniquely trained to know how to safely respond to hazards, such as fires, light search and rescue, team organization, and disaster medical operations. Most importantly, CERT responders also know when not to go into a disaster situation. Their primary role is to serve as the bridge in a disaster emergency, between the community and the Professional First Responders.

Unfortunately, there hasn't been anyone for a long while to facilitate CERT in Port Ludlow. I'm excited to announce that's all going to change.

The PLVC-EM is pleased to welcome Debbie Wills as its new CERT Coordinator. As such, Debbie will facilitate the CERT program in our community by educating a dedicated team of volunteers in how to appropriately respond in a disaster situation. She will coordinate this training with the Port Ludlow Fire Department in order to keep the CERT Team's skills at its peak. The best part is, this is not Debbie's first round with emergency preparedness.

Prior to moving to Port Ludlow in 2007, Debbie served as a San Diego County Sheriff's Investigator and was on San Diego County Sheriff's Search and Rescue (SAR) unit, including attending and instructing several courses in Incident Command System (ICS) and all facets of search and rescue. She also trained and was attached to the San Diego, CA-8 FEMA Urban Search and Rescue Task Force (USAR) and trained with the Orange County, CA-5 USAR Task Force to include Rescue Systems 1 and Hazard Materials.

According to Debbie, one of the most wonderful resources she has is her husband, Dale, a 34-year veteran of the Orange County Fire Authority (OCFA), and her in-house authority on responding to emergencies from a firefighter's perspective. Dale is currently one of the fifty trained CERT volunteers and serves as his neighborhood co-block captain.

Further, Port Ludlow resident Gary Hicks, a retired naval officer and consulting engineer and project manager, will also be working with Debbie as a trainer, in support of the Jefferson County and Port Ludlow CERT program. He is a current U.S. Power Squadron (USPS) Certified Instructor for boating courses and is active in the N. Olympic Sail and Power Squadron. He is an officer and serves as Secretary on the Port Ludlow Yacht Club Board.

Interior painting of the great room and hallways was completed. The carpet replacement was to continue through the next week. The Bay Club windows have been cleaned and the parking lot has been re-stripped. The bright yellow markings on sidewalk areas are temporary and meant to alert walkers to cracks and unevenness until repairs are completed sometime in August. The pool and spa pump room plumbing was to be replaced later that month. This will involve a two - three day closure of the area while circulation is ceased to facilitate new line installation. The scheduled date for repair was June 26 - 28. Roof cleaning will likely occur in August. Annual Meeting notices were to go out to members the next Friday. The meeting is scheduled for **Wednesday, July 18**, at 3:00 p.m.

Treasurer's Report: Dan Quail reported as of May 31, the SBCA had total current assets of \$549,645.94 and total

fixed assets of \$6,401.49. Total assets were \$556,047.43. \$6,715.50 of member assessments was transferred to reserves. Operating expenses for May were \$47,475.07, and reserve expenses for the month were 28,554.28.

Board Communications: None

Committee Reports and assignments:

Architectural Review Committee (ARC): Vicki Derrenberger, Chair, reported that 11 applications were reviewed and approved for exterior painting projects, multiple tree removals, a roof and a deck replacement, a patio addition, and a lot clearing for new home construction. A possible revision to a design standard was discussed. As a result, three motions to the board were made and passed. These may be viewed on request at the Bay Club's ARC office.

Activities and Amenities Committee: Music on the Green netted \$700. The intention was to stay small and a lot was learned. Next time this event will be advertised in the *Voice* and be better prepared. A pancake breakfast is planned for August. The End of Summer Games volunteers are needed. A reception on the patio will follow the annual meeting.

Facilities Committee: Chris Spagle reported that another cleanout of the storage space is needed. A discussion of the hallway pictures revealed that they may be worth \$400 to \$500 each, after research by Teresa Forrest and Mark Torres. Other subjects included: to rent rather than buy new pictures for the hallway; to determine where to move the TV in the great room; and to update the sound system. Quail discussed payment options for the latter. The new great room furniture should be delivered (hopefully) by July 12.

Finance Committee: Quail reported no major issues. Income is ahead of budget by \$28,000, mostly from Port Ludlow Associates (PLA) capital contributions from the Cove sales. Expenses are below budget by \$18,000 but may change due to an added pay period in June. Chris

Spagle and Ed Knodel did a spot check of finance and found all in proper order. Quail moved, and Dave Jurca seconded, that the board approve the proposed new sound system, at a cost of \$8,000. This will be split by the SBCA and Port Ludlow Performing Arts (PLPA) equally, with an agreement to work out ownership prior to purchase. The motion passed unanimously.

Human Resources: No report

Communications Committee: Sheila Twohey reported that the meeting was deferred to June 11. Work is continuing on the new web site.

A motion was made and passed to approve all Committee reports.

Old Business: Twohey made the motion to amend SBCA Policies and Procedures, B.1. as submitted and include Exhibit A, which modifies the rate structure for facility use fees, and Exhibit B, which defines which groups belong to a user class known as “Port Ludlow Community Groups.” This amendment will be effective July 1, 2018. This was seconded. Jurca expressed concerns that though these are some good arguments, “I sympathize with motivations and want all to keep in mind our goal to increase usage by members. Find a way to monitor if the new policy leads to lower use. I reluctantly support the motion.” Skinner agreed but said we can advertise to other groups. Twohey cited the motion covers recommendations from the general manager regarding fee structure and community groups favored status. Quail added, “Tough one. Thinking about 85% approval (of the questionnaire) and 15% opposed, approximately 50 Community Groups, 600 meetings per year = 12,000 people per year using all the amenities, contributes to wear and tear.” After more audience remarks, the motion passed unanimously.

New Business: None
